Events	Public school segregation was ruled illegal in the U.S. by a Supreme Court case which overturned all of the segregation laws in the country; however, the enactment of integration took many years, turmoil and bloodshed to integrate the country.  The words "under God" were added to the Pledge of Allegiance.  Hurricane Hazel becomes the first recorded category 4 hurricane to make landfall as far north as North Carolina.  The first nuclear-powered submarine, the USS Nautilus, is launched.
Wars, battles, & the military	Veterans Day finally became a federal holiday to mark the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice that ended WWI on November 11, 1918.
Financial & monetary events	Employer contributions to employee health plans became exempt from employee taxable income, and as a result, the demand for group health insurance increased.  The DJIA closes above the peak it reached just before the 1929 crash for the first time ever.
Transportation	Power windows become available in some cars.  The radar gun used by police to catch speeders was invented.  The Nash Ambassador was the first American car to include fully-integrated heating, ventilating, and AC.
Communication & publishing	The first issue of Sports Illustrated is published.  After 2,956 episodes over 21 years, the last new episode of "The Lone Ranger" is aired on radio.  "Flash Gordon" becomes a TV series for two seasons.
Medicine, discoveries & exploration	The first successful kidney transplant was performed in Boston.  Chlorpromazine, discovered in 1952 and later trade named Thorazine, was approved by the FDA in 1954 as a preferred alternative to electroshock therapy.
Inventions	The first remote-control garage door opener was introduced by Genie.  Although filter-tipped cigarettes were first invented in 1927, it wasn't until 1954 that the machinery became available to mass produce them in significant numbers.
Cultural & entertainment	"Captain Kangaroo", the first network children's TV show on CBS, begins airing.  NBC launches "The Tonight Show" featuring comedian Steve Allen. The Tonight Show would dominate late night TV until 1993.  The Miss America Pageant is broadcast on TV for the first time.
Conveniences	Swanson introduced the TV Dinner in 1954, but began removing the name "TV Dinner" from packaging in the 1960's.  CPR was first introduced.  The first successful electric toothbrush was developed in Switzerland.
Buildings, landmarks & cities	The J. Paul Getty Museum opened in Los Angeles, CA.
